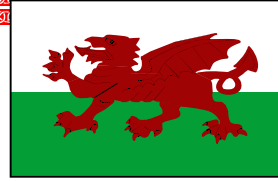

Ada Mae Lewis was elected president of the Board of Trustees for the Welsh National Gymanfa Ganu Association (WNGGA) during the North American Festival of Wales (NAFOW), Pittsburgh, PA. The WNGGA, an organization to preserve and promote Welsh cultural heritage, has a membership of over 2,500 and sponsors the NAFOW annually in the USA or Canada. She encourages everyone to attend the 2010 NAFOW in Portland, OR, September 2-5-2010.

She has been president of the Board of Directors of Cymdeithas Madog, the Welsh Studies Institute in North America, Inc., <http://madog.org>/, president of the Iowa Welsh Society and is co-vice-president of the Great Plains Welsh Heritage Project,

<http://welshheritage.org/> and a member of the Endowment Fund Board of Trustees for the same organization.

Ada Mae has been interested in Wales since she was a small child in South Dakota. Her grandfather was Welsh speaking and she heard about Wales from her grandfather and father. Her great grandparents, Lewis and Jane Davies Lewis emigrated to Wisconsin from the Devil's Bridge and Llanidloes areas. Later, they homesteaded in Dakota Territory. She is fortunate to be in contact with and visit cousins living in Wales.

She has lived in Ames, IA for a number of years, moving there from Nicaragua, Central America, where she worked for the Peace Corps and Smithsonian Institute Environmental Program teaching a post graduate program in integrated pest management at the National University.

Dr. Lewis was a microbiologist with the US Department of Agriculture for years and for the last 15 years she has owned Lewis Biologics Consulting, Inc., a consulting firm working with companies needing to understand the regulations of USDA as they pertain to the licensing, manufacture and distribution of veterinary biologics, such as vaccines, serums, diagnostic test kits, etc. She and a partner own the consulting firm, Consultants for Veterinary Biologics.

She is a passionate gardener and has a small stream in her front yard inspired by the curving stream at the entrance of The National Botanic Gardens in Wales at Llanarthne, Carmarthenshire

Wales's Past to Go Online

The National Library of Wales has announced, in its latest newsletter that a grant for 2 million pounds has been received specifically to digitize 2 million pages of newspapers and magazines relating to Wales. The project is expected to be completed and available online by 2012. We note that *Y Drych* (Utica, N.Y. 1851-) which GPWHP owns on micro-film is *not* listed among the publications included in the digitization project. We have e-mailed Andrew Green, National Librarian, to inquire whether *Y Drych* will be digitized in this project.

Another Welsh-American publication, *The Cambrian* will be digitized and online by the end of September 2009. www.ohiocambrian.lige.org.uk thanks to a generous donation by Evan F. and Elizabeth F. Davies of Oak Hill, Ohio, as part of the Wales-Ohio Project.

The Cambrian, between 1880 to 1919, was one of the most popular magazines read by Welsh-Americans. It was written in the English language which makes translation unnecessary, unlike *Y Drych* which was written in Welsh for most of its history. Almost 19,000 pages of *The Cambrian* will appear on the internet and will be searchable. What a marvelous resource this will be for researchers

Welsh Lamb Steaks with Red Currant Glaze

Ingredients :

- 2 Tablespoons Olive Oil
- 1.5 pounds Welsh Lamb Chump Steaks
- 2 cloves Garlic, peeled and crushed
- 3 sprigs fresh Rosemary
- Salt and freshly ground Black Pepper
- 14 oz Red Wine
- 2 Tablespoons Red Currant Jelly
- 2 Tablespoons Port Jelly
- 2 teaspoons Fresh Lemon Juice

Method

Heat the Olive Oil in an oven-proof frying pan and brown the Lamb on both sides for 2-3 minutes.

Add the Garlic and Rosemary, season and place in a preheated oven of 425 degrees for 7 to 10 minutes.

Remove the Lamb from the oven and turn the heat off. Wrap the Lamb loosely in foil and return it to the oven for a further 10 minutes.

Drain off any excess fat from the pan. Stir in the Red Wine, Red Currant and Port Jelly. Bring to a boil and simmer for 10-15 minutes or until syrupy and reduced by half. Add the Lemon juice and season if required.

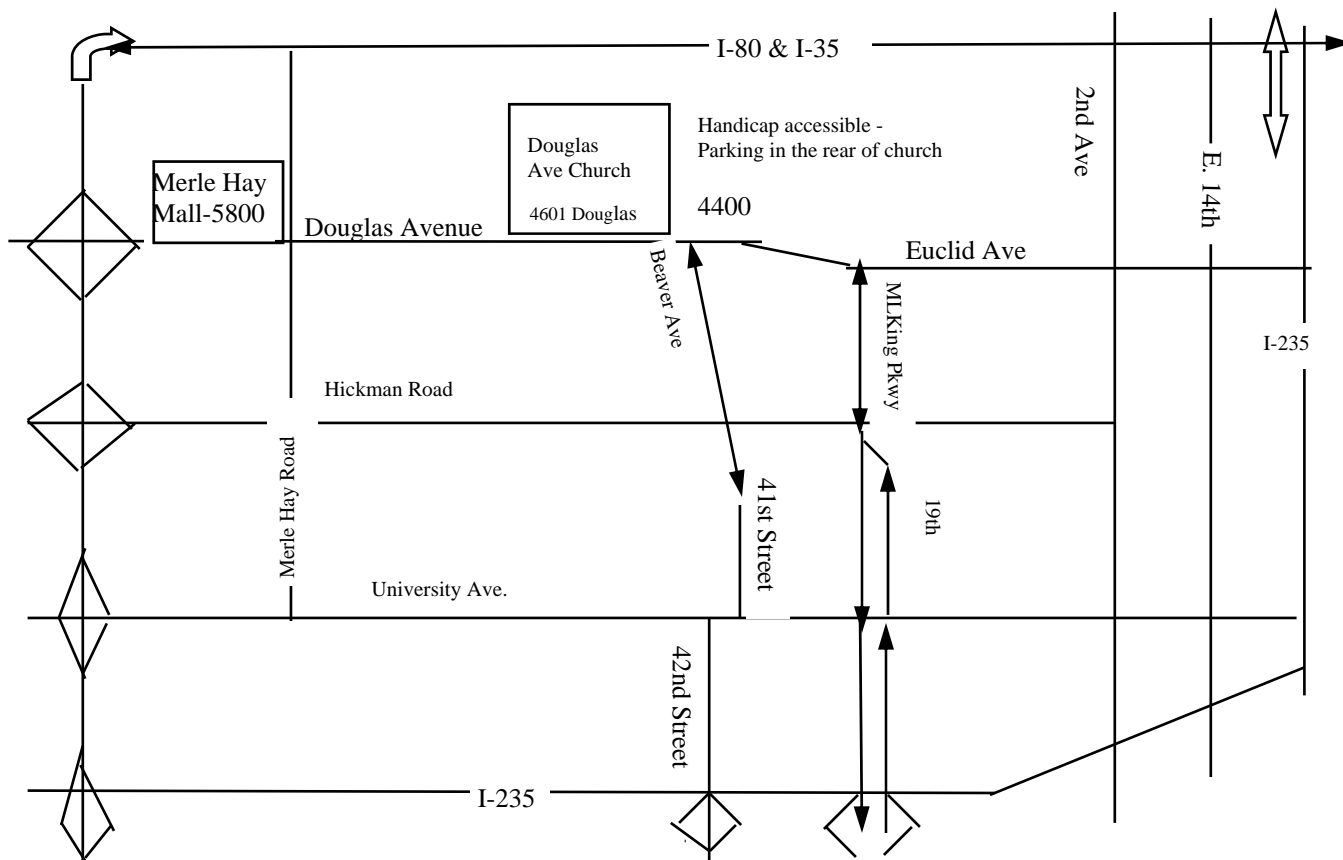
To Serve, spoon the glaze over the lamb and serve with a selection of steamed baby vegetables.

Notes: Rosemary, Red Currant and Port Jelly and Red Wine are classic accompaniments to Roast Lamb and this recipe combines all three.
